MASS READINGS THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (YEAR C) FIRST READING

Nehemiah 8:2-6, 8-10

Ezra read from the law of God and the people understood what was read.

Ezra the priest brought the Law before the assembly, consisting of men, women, and children old enough to understand. This was the first day of the seventh month. On the square before the Water Gate, in the presence of the men and women, and children old enough to understand, he read from the book from early morning till noon; all the people listened attentively to the Book of the Law. Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden dais erected for the purpose. In full view of all the people – since he stood higher than all the people – Ezra opened the book; and when he opened it all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people raised their hands and answered, 'Amen! Amen!'; then they bowed down and, face to the ground, prostrated themselves before the Lord. And Ezra read from the Law of God, translating and giving the sense, so that the people understood what was read. Then Nehemiah – His Excellency – and Ezra, priest and scribe and the Levites who were instructing the people said to all the people, 'This day is sacred to the Lord your God. Do not be mournful, do not weep.' For the people were all in tears as they listened to the words of the Law. He then said, 'Go, eat the fat, drink the sweet wine, and send a portion to the man who has nothing prepared ready. For this day is sacred to our Lord. Do not be sad: the joy of the Lord is your stronghold.'

SECOND READING Corinthians 12:12-30

You together are Christ's body; but each of you is a different part of it.

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink. Nor is the body to be identified with any one of its many parts. If the foot were to say, 'I am not a hand and so I do not belong to the body', would that mean that it stopped being part of the body? If the ear were to say, 'I am not an eye, and so I do not belong to the body', would that mean that it was not a part of the body? If your whole body was just one eye, how would you hear anything? If it was just one ear, how would you smell anything? Instead of that, God put all the separate parts into the body on purpose. If all the parts were the same, how could it be a body? As it is, the parts are many but the body is one. The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I do not need you', nor can the head say to the feet, 'I do not need you.' What is more, it is precisely the parts of the body that seem to be the weakest which are the indispensable ones; and it is the least honourable parts of the body that we clothe with the greatest care. So our more improper parts get decorated in a way that our more proper parts do not need. God has arranged the body so that more dignity is given to the parts which are without it, and that there may not be disagreements inside the body, but that each part may be equally concerned for all the others. If one part is hurt, all parts are hurt with it. If one part is given special honour, all parts enjoy it. Now you together are Christ's body; but each of you is a different part of it. In the Church, God has given the first place to apostles, the second to prophets, the third to teachers; after them, miracles, and after them the gift of healing; helpers, good leaders, those with many languages. Are all of them apostles, or all of them prophets, or all of them teachers? Do they all have the gift of healing?

GOSPEL Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

The text is being fulfilled today.

Seeing that many others have undertaken to draw up accounts of the events that have taken place among us, exactly as these were handed down to us by those who from the outset were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word, I in my turn, after carefully going over the whole story from the beginning, have decided to write an ordered account for you, Theophilus, so that your Excellency may learn how well founded the teaching is that you have received. Jesus, with the power of the Spirit in him, returned to Galilee; and his reputation spread throughout the countryside. He taught in their synagogues and everyone praised him. He came to Nazara, where he had been brought up, and went into the synagogue on the sabbath day as he usually did. He stood up to read and they handed him the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. Unrolling the scroll he found the place where it is written: The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for he has anointed me. He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour. He then rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the assistant and sat down. And all eyes in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to speak to them, 'This text is being fulfilled today even as you listen.'

The Gospel of Luke in Year 'C'

Now that the last three Sundays have explored themes of Epiphany, we now start going through Luke's Gospel for most Sundays till December. Here are just a few distinctive points for you to keep in mind as you hear this gospel in the coming year:

- St Luke is the only evangelist who was born a gentile. He is also
 the only evangelist who has also given an account of the early
 Church in his Acts of the Apostles. So his accounts starts with The
 angel appearing to Zechariah in the temple, the heart of the Jewish
 tradition but for the Romans a remote backwater of the Roman
 Empire and ends with Paul in Rome, proclaiming the Good News in
 Rome, the most powerful city in the world at that time
- St Luke places emphasis on the compassion and mercy of God revealed through Christ. Famous stories that come to represent the Christian faith such as the parables of the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal son and the conversion of Zacchaeus only appear in this Gospel. It is only in Luke's gospel that we have Jesus forgiving his killers while on the Cross and his announcement to the thief 'I tell you truly, today you will be with me in paradise
- Along with these stories of compassion we have a number of references of Jesus on his own praying, we have teaching on prayer and famously we have Mary sitting at the feet of Jesus, with Martha being told Mary has chosen the better part. So an integration of contemplation and compassion is central to Luke's understanding of Jesus
- Most of the famous stories associated with the birth of Jesus are found in this Gospel. The annunciation, the visitation, the appearance to the shepherds, the stories of the Presentation and the finding of Jesus in the temple are only found in this Gospel.
- It is this Gospel that a great deal of emphasis is given to the Mother of Jesus. The Angel appearing to Mary, the visit to Elizabeth, her telling of the Magnifcat, Mary giving birth in a stable and Mary at Pentecost are all stories only found this gospel
- Finally we have a number of references to the Holy Spirit. It only Luke who gives is the story of Pentecost, with the Holy Spirit coming on the apostles, and the movement of the Spirit is found in the Gospel and in Acts

I hope from the above and from your own prayer you will see the significance of Luke gospel throughout this year, especially in his call for a deep integration of our contemplation and action

If the date on your DBS is prior to January 2016 then you need to apply for an update. You no longer require a DBS if you are a welcomer. Eucharistic Ministers only need to update their DBS if they take Holy Communion out to someone in the community. If you just assist during Mass or Services of Word and Communion, but do not take Holy Communion out then you no longer need a DBS. Clare Harvey the Parish Safeguarding Representative for both churches will be available after Masses this weekend to assist. Please let her know if you know that your DBS needs updating, if you no longer require one or if you intend to update online. Thanks.

Urgent Appeal for Volunteers for Trinity Charity Shop

The Trinity Charity Shop on Wallsend Road, opposite St Joseph's Primary School, is an ecumenical venture that provides much needed financial help for local churches, Anglican and Catholic.
