FIRST READING

Who can divine the will of the Lord?

What man indeed can know the intentions of God? Who can divine the will of the Lord? The reasonings of mortals are unsure and our intentions unstable; for a perishable body presses down the soul, and this tent of clay weighs down the teeming mind. It is hard enough for us to work out what is on earth, laborious to know what lies within our reach; who, then, can discover what is in the heavens? As for your intention, who could have learnt it, had you not granted Wisdom and sent your holy spirit from above? Thus have the paths of those on earth been straightened and men been taught what pleases you, and saved, by Wisdom.

SECOND READING

Have him back, not as a slave any more, but as a dear brother.

Philemon 1:9-10. 12-17

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him – I could say – a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me. The word of the Lord.

None of you can be my disciples unless he gives up all his possessions.

Luke 14:25-33

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. 'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.' Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'

Mercy Associates "a way of living out your baptismal call"

Mercy Associates were born out of the vision of Venerable Catherine McAuley, the foundress of the Sisters of Mercy. Her aim was to gather together a group of lay women who would support her in her ministry to alleviate the suffering of the poor, sick and uneducated but who would be able to return to their worldly life. These she liked to call her "associates". It was only later that the Congregation of the Sisters of Mercy was founded.

Mercy Associates as we know them today are a result of Vatican II. The Council called for all Religious to stay faithful to the spirit of their founder, to rediscover their charism and share it with the laity. To lay people it emphasised that their Baptismal Vocation was first and foremost "a call to personal holiness".

With this in mind the General Chapter of the Sisters of Mercy in 1980 allowed interested sisters throughout the UK to set about inviting lay people to form associate groups. The main purpose of the groups being to deepen our Christian call, be merciful wherever we are and to help others in practical ways.

They are encouraged to meet regularly, to join together in prayer and to share the Mercy Vocation with each other.

The first recorded groups were formed in Oldham and Colwyn Bay in 1982. The North Shields group was formed in 1994. There are local groups in Heaton and Alnwick, more throughout the UK as well as in Kenya, the Philippines and Romania.

There are 14 Associates in the North Shields group. 11 of us meet once month in the afternoon in the Convent, 3 unable to attend support us in prayer. There we share the monthly prayer, listen to a mercy related talk, catch up on news of Mercy projects throughout the world and plan our own projects. We join with our neighbouring groups for an annual retreat day, hold at least 2 coffee mornings a year to help fund the appeals we have received, we collect food for Christmas parcels and have been active in raising funds to support those affected by human trafficking.

We have strong links to St Joseph's School. The Youth Mercy Association was founded here at St Joseph's in 2000. It now meets fortnightly during the lunch hour, taking part in prayer, discussion and activities to deepen their awareness of the Works of Mercy. They have been active in raising funds for the Mercy Missions and Mary's Meals and have visited the Little Sisters of the Poor Care Home. Working towards a "care of the environment" badge using the Mercy International Season of Creation calendar they are trying to increase their understanding of the 8th Work of Mercy given to us by Pope Francis – "caring for our common world".

We would like to express our grateful appreciation to everyone who has supported us in any way and hope you will continue to do so in the future and, if you would like to join us you would be made very welcome.

Partnership Community and Property Review

During the summer it was announced that after an initial pilot scheme involving three partnerships, the next seven partnerships in the Diocese to undergo a Partnership Community and Property Review (PCPR), would include the Tynemouth Priory Partnership. This PCPR will have a number of strands:

- Inviting each parish to explore the spiritual and social needs within their parish and wider community.
- To review the property assets in each parish.
- To explore how property within parishes and the parish could be used to meet identified needs.
- To decide on what is the most productive use of our properties for our mission.

The Partnership Development Group will be meeting the Diocesan Co-ordinator of the PCPR, Jeremy Brock, in September. At this meeting, Jeremy will explain the nature of the PCPR process.

In consultation with Jeremy Brock, Mgr Faley as Partnership Dean, and Ian Pearson as Chair of the PDG, it has been agreed that to help parishes to identify needs in their area training will be offered. This training will be provided members by Tyne and Wear Citizens, which will include parishioners in the partnership. It is hoped that this training will provide parishes with the tools to engage with people in the community to discover the concerns and needs within our communities. This training will take place at St Cuthbert's on Saturday October 12th from 10am-3pm. If you have any queries about any of the above please contact Fr Chris.
