Lying in bed I wonder, 'When will it be day?' Risen I think, 'How slowly evening comes!' Restlessly I fret till twilight falls. Swifter than a weaver's shuttle my days have passed, and vanished, leaving no hope behind. Remember that my life is but a breath, and that my eyes will never again see joy.

Re-opening of Churches

I discussed with the Parish Council my thoughts on the re-opening of Church. I noted that at the moment infection rates are falling and North Tyneside is half of the national average, so safer than 75% of England. If infection rates continue to fall and guidance from the Government and the Diocese has not changed I am minded to open Churches for the weekend of 12th/13th/14th February which is the weekend before Ash Wednesday with the hope that we can also have Masses for Ash Wednesday. Ashes will not be smeared on your forehead but sprinkled on top of the head.

I will make a decision next weekend. I am sure you will appreciate why we have to be so provisional at the moment.

Lent

Ash Wednesday is February 17th. In discussions with the Liturgy group and Parish Council the following has been decided

Though we hope the Churches will be re-opened by then may of our activities will be offered on line. They include:

- A gathering on a Wednesday evening via Zoom where a parishioner will lead a time of prayer and reflection. Any volunteers will be appreciated
- Stations of the Cross will be celebrated on a Sunday afternoon in Lent at 4pm. There will be a mixed economy of pre-recorded Stations, Station via zoom and live events in Church but also live streamed
- Fr Chris will lead a day of Reflection for the Parish on Saturday 13th March via zoom from 10-2pm The theme will be: Covid a year on - God's call for us?

Tyne and Wear Citizens

It was agreed that Fr Chris should sign up the parish at a cost of \pounds 1,200 per year which will be reviewed in a years time by the PPC. The PPC agreed this because...

- Pope Francis calls us to be there with those on the margins of society. Tyne and Wear Citizens look to develop people and groups which allows them to do their faith based work as citizens. In society it is money and government who have the power and T&W citizens develops relational power within civic society consisting of charities and church groups to enable a greater working together to respond to need at a grass roots level.
- It is a direction in which it was felt the parish could develop its mission and ministry and is a particular focus of the Parish Proclaimers.

- Pope Francis again states that to recover the dignity of people, we need to go to the margins of society. Such involvement leads us to be an invisible army for this pandemic.
- The training that membership brings allows us to focus our listening and respond in an informed way to need.
- Fr Chris has proposed that the Proclaimers group be the Core Group to support him and the parish in ensuring that we get the most from our membership. If anyone is interested is being involved please contact Fr Chris.

Year of St Joseph

In his Apostolic Letter Patris Corde (With a Father's Heart), Pope Francis has proclaimed a special Year of St. Joseph, from the 8th December 2020 to 8th December 2021. 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Racial Justice Sunday

Last Sunday, 31st January was Racial Justice Sunday. The Catholic Association of Racial Justice (CARJ) has written the following reflection:

The theme is 'A Time to Act'. Racial issues and inequalities were identified nationally and internationally in 2020 generating awareness, emotion and outrage. In light of this Racial Justice Sunday 2021 is particularly significant. Action is needed to further the cause of racial justice but what can we do?

At the beginning of his public ministry Jesus outlines his Mission in the synagogue in Nazareth:

'He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour'.

His ministry was one of compassionate involvement, concern for the disadvantaged. Aware of obstacles, including those of the Law, which limited joy and fulfilment Jesus acted. He confronted, sometimes angrily, what undermined a person's dignity. The theme of Racial Justice Sunday 2021 is A Time to Act. Racial issues and inequalities were identified nationally and internationally in 2020 generating awareness, emotion and outrage. In light of this Racial Justice Sunday 2021 is particularly significant. Action is needed.

Action is needed to further the cause of racial justice. What can we do? In recent years Pope Francis has repeatedly used four verbs encouraging positive and direct action in relation to migrants and refugees, 'Welcome, Protect, Promote and Integrate'. These same words are essential to advancing the cause of racial justice. None can be omitted; it is as necessary to have plans to Promote and Integrate as it is to Welcome.
