The Diocesan Mass for Altar Servers will be at 11am on Saturday 20th November at St Mary's Cathedral, Newcastle. Bishop Robert will celebrate the Mass.

Any Extra-Ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion who have received their 'booster jab' are invited to let Fr Martin know if you are willing to take Holy Communion to the sick, elderly and housebound of the parish.

The Guidelines issued by the Diocese mean that people visting Church for services are still requested to sanitise their hands and wear face-covering. Social distancing is now reduced to one metre. These guidelines will be reviewed again by the Diocese in November. It is no longer necessary to book to attend Mass.

First Reading

1 Kings 17:10-16

In the middle of a famine, a poor widow shares the last of her food with the prophet Elijah, and far from losing by so doing, she is enriched.

Elijah the Prophet went off to Sidon. And when he reached the city gate, there was a widow gathering sticks; addressing her he said, 'Please bring a little water in a vessel for me to drink.' She was setting off to bring it when he called after her. 'Please' he said, 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand.' 'As the Lord your God lives,' she replied, 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid, go and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and for your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel: Jar of meal shall not be spent, jug of oil shall not be emptied, before the day when the Lord sends rain on the face of the earth.' The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.

Responsorial Psalm Psalm 145

Response: My soul, give praise to the Lord.

- It is the Lord who keeps faith for ever, 2. who is just to those who are oppressed. It is he who gives bread to the hungry, the Lord, who sets prisoners free.
- The Lord upholds the widow and orphan but thwarts the path of the wicked.

 Zion's God, from age to age.

It is the Lord who gives sight to the blind, who raised up those who are bowed down, It is the Lord who loves the just, the Lord, who protects the stranger.

Second Reading Hebrews 9:24-28

Through his death Christ has taken our sins upon himself and has opened for us the door to salvation.

It is not as though Christ had entered a man-made sanctuary which was only modelled on the real one; but it was heaven itself, so that he could appear in the actual presence of God on our behalf. And he does not have to offer himself again and again, like the high priest going into the sanctuary year after year with the blood that is not his own, or else he would have had to suffer over and over again since the world began. Instead of that, he has made his appearance once and for all, now at the end of the last age, to do away with sin by sacrificing himself. Since men only die once, and after that comes judgement, so Christ, too, offers himself only once to take the faults of many on himself, and when he appears a second time, it will not be to deal with sin but to reward with salvation those who are waiting for him.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia. Even if you have to die, says the Lord, keep faithful, and I will give you the crown of life. Alleluia!

Gospel Reading Mark 12:41-44

In the eyes of others the offering of the widow was the least, but in the eyes of Christ it was the greatest.

Jesus sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the treasury, and many of the rich put in a great deal. A poor widow came and put in two small coins, the equivalent of a penny. Then he called to his disciples and said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, this poor widow has put more in than all who have contributed to the treasury; for they have all put in money they had over, but she from the little she had has put in everything she possessed, all she had to live on.'

Question of the week What are you willing to give out of love for God that would be a hardship for you?
