A Son is given to us.

Isaiah 9:1-7

The people that walked in darkness has seen a great light; on those who live in a land of deep shadow a light has shone. You have made their gladness greater, you have made their joy increase; they rejoice in your presence as men rejoice at harvest time, as men are happy when they are dividing the spoils. For the yoke that was weighing on him, the barb across his shoulders, the rod of his oppressor, these you break as on the day of Midian. While they were there the time came for her have her child, and she birth to a son, her first-born. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger because there was no room for them at the inn. In the countryside close by there were shepherds who lived in the fields and took it in turns to watch their flocks during the night. The angel of the Lord appeared to them and the glory of the Lord shone round them. They were terrified, but the angel said, 'Do not be afraid. Listen, I bring you news of great joy, a joy to be shared by the whole people. Today in the town of David a saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. In this last week-end of 2022, it is an opportunity to look back and give thanks. It is easy to forget that last year we will still limited by Covid restrictions. Slowly but surely parish life has resumed to some sort of normality we know before the pandemic. It has been heartening to see how the parish social group has regrouped and were able to organise a lovely (and profitable) coffee morning last month. It has been heartening to know that the parish is concerned to help the local community with the cost of living crisis. It is a wonderful sign of the generosity and welcome of our community. I have also been inspired by our young people in their campaign to ensure 16-17 year old do not have to pay adult bus fares. As part of our concern for the environment I am very grateful to the efforts of Paul Ladler on the side garden which now has some of Fr Michael Hickey's sculptures. I would like this part of the garden to be called this the' Fr Michael Hickey Memorial Garden'.

I will cherish the memory of reading out St John's Passion narrative in the open air. I am always open to creative way the good news can be announced to others.

I am also aware that this year as a parish we lost many much loved parishioners who made massive contributions to our parish over many years. They are sorely missed but their impact and the memory of that they contributed will live on

I am also conscious that we have also welcomed new parishioners, not just those who have been baptised, but those who come into the parish. We hope that feel welcomed and that they belong to the community able to feel free to contribute as much as they can. I appreciate that with the resignation of Bishop Robert, we are at a time of uncertainty as a diocese.

So much of your contributions are carried out 'behind the scenes 'and I am sure that I am not aware of al that people do but your generosity, faith and commitment to the parish is much appreciated.
