#### **SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER - B** FIRST READING

Acts 4:32-35

United, heart and soul.

The whole group of believers was united, heart and soul; no one claimed for his own use anything that he had, as everything they owned was held in common. The apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus with great power, and they were all given great respect. None of their members was ever in want, as all those who owned land or houses would sell them, and bring the money from them, to present it to the apostles: it was then distributed to any members who might be in need.

Psalm 117 Responsorial Psalm

Response: Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, for his love has no end.

- 1. Let the sons of Israel say: 'His love has no end.' Let the sons of Aaron say: 'His love has no end.' Let those who fear the Lord say: 'His love has no end.'
- 3. The stone which the builders rejected has become the corner stone. This is the work of the Lord. a marvel in our eyes. This day was made by the Lord; we rejoice and are glad.

SECOND READING John 5:1-6

Anyone who has been begotten by God has already overcome the world.

Whoever believes that Jesus is the Christ has been begotten by God; and whoever loves the Father that begot him loves the child whom he begets. We can be sure that we love God's children if we love God himself and do what he has commanded us; this is what loving God is - keeping his commandments; and his commandments are not difficult, because anyone who has been begotten by God has already overcome the world; this is the victory over the world – our faith. Who can overcome the world? Only the man who believes that Jesus is the Son of God: Jesus Christ who came by water and blood, not with water only, but with water and blood; with the Spirit as another witness – since the Spirit is the truth.

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus said: 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' Alleluia!

**GOSPEL** John 20:19-31

Eight days later, Jesus came.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you', and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you. 'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.' Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord,' he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you,' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him: 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

# Low & Divine Mercy Sunday

This week-end may seem to be an anti-climax from all the joy and wonder of the Resurrection but as we finish the Easter Octave, the liturgy given us another opportunity to reflect on the significance of the last week-end. The story focusing on St Thomas searching for faith in the Risen Christ acknowledges 3 important aspects. The first is the prominence of Jesus's wounds. These are not scars, the risen and glorious body of Christ is still wounded. As we are called to share in his glory and risen life that transforms and renews us it does not mean that earthy realities of being human are somehow eradicated. We are called to integrate all the messiness and struggle of what it means to be human with this new life in Christ. They co-exist. Are struggles and hurts reminds us of our need of grace. The glory of sharing in Christ's risen life means that our human realities do not have the ultimate power of us.

We also have the link with Christmas. No angels, shepherds or Kings but the true significance of God becoming human and Christ being the ultimate expression of the divine is expressed in the Thomas' expression of 'My Lord and God'. Finally, the significance of peace. The risen life and the restoration of the relationship between God and humanity is not achieved through violence. The risen Christ is the source of peace at all levels of humanity and society. May we truly know this peace.

This weekend we will have a Pastoral Letter from Bishop Stephen.

# Pope Francis on Prayer

We consider how Jesus himself prayed, for this reveals key aspects of how we also are to pray. Even when immersed in caring for the people. Christ never neglected his dialogue with the Father, which guided all that he did and taught. In solitary prayer he nurtured a loving intimacy with his Father, an intimacy for which we too yearn. From our Lord's example, we see that prayer first means listening, and encountering God: the primary desire of each day. Second, we need to pray with perseverance, so that it can become a rule of life, gradually transforming us and, by God's grace, strengthening and sustaining us in times of tribulation. Third, solitude and silence are essential for prayer, not in order to escape from the world but, on the contrary, to help us open ourselves more effectively to the needs of others. Finally, prayer reminds us that everything depends on God. This leads us to recover the proper sense of our relationship with him and with the whole of creation. Let us, then, learn from Jesus, the master of prayer – who alone can grant us true iov and peace.
