FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER - B FIRST READING

Acts 4:8-12

This is the only name by which we can be saved.

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Peter said: 'Rulers of the people, and elders! If you are questioning us today about an act of kindness to a cripple, and asking us how he was healed, then I am glad to tell you all, and would indeed be glad to tell the whole people of Israel, that it was by the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, the one you crucified, whom God raised from the dead, by this name and by no other that this man is able to stand up perfectly healthy, here in your presence, today. This is the stone rejected by you the builders, but which has proved to be the keystone. For of all the names in the world given to men, this is the only one by which we can be saved.'

The good shepherd is one who lays down his life for his sheep.

Jesus said: 'I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd is one who lays down his life for his sheep. The hired man, since he is not the shepherd and the sheep do not belong to him, abandons the sheep and runs away as soon as he sees a wolf coming, and then the wolf attacks and scatters the sheep; this is because he is only a hired man and has no concern for the sheep. 'I am the good shepherd; I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for my sheep. And there are other sheep I have that are not of this fold, and these I have to lead as well. They too will listen to my voice, and there will be only one flock, and one shepherd. 'The Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me; I lay it down of my own free will, and as it is in my power to lay it down, so it is in my power to take it up again; and this is the command I have been given by my Father.'

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

Good Shepherd Sunday

Although the Fourth Sunday of Easter have different reading for each year of the 3-year cycle, there is one key central and important image which is of Christ as the Good Shepherd Sunday. This is traditionally the Sunday we are called to pray for vocations to Priesthood and Religious Life, but acknowledging that we are a synodal Church, all journeying together, it would seem that we need to pray for all who are aware of their vocation and pray that they are faithful to that call be that, whether it is being single, married, widowed or separated, professed or ordained. It is important that we also pray for those who are discerning God's call for themselves. Whether we are already committed to a particular vocation or at stage of life where we are discerning our call, we know for certain that we are all united through our baptism to not only follow Christ as one of his friends but we are seeking to be conformed into his image. It through being conformed into image that we then discern which way of life we are being called. None is superior to the other, they are all needed and contribute to the life of the Church. I am also clear that we need others to help us to discern how live out our joint discipleship and different vocations. We need someone whom we can be honest as we discern what our call to be like Christ means for us in the here and now. So, in praying for each other as we discern God's call, may we able to listen to one another as we discern the call of the Good Shepherd and follow him.

Pope Francis on Prayer

we now consider how our prayerful dialogue with God is meant to embrace the events of each day, in our homes, daily chores or work. All our thoughts and activities should be a part of our daily conversation with the Lord. The Catechism teaches that "it is in the present that we encounter God, not yesterday or tomorrow, but today" (No. 2659). There is no aspect of our everyday lives, however mundane, that cannot be offered in prayer to God and become an occasion of deeper union with him. As we come to know Christ more intimately in prayer, our hearts are expanded to embrace in love and solidarity all those around us, above all the poor, the unhappy and those in need. Blaise Pascal once observed that human beings are so frail that even a drop of water can destroy us (cf. Thoughts, No. 347). Yet in our fragility, prayer is a mark of our supreme grandeur, for prayer can work miracles in our world, transform lives and history, and serve the coming of God's kingdom of justice and peace.
