#### 19th Sunday of the Year

If I was to ask people which is the most important Sacrament in the life of the Church, I think most people would say the Eucharist or the Mass, though some may say Baptism, since that is the gateway to all Sacraments. My answer would be Christ himself. When we talk of Sacraments I imagine most people think of the seven Sacramental Rites of the Church. In the Second Vatican Council, the Church sought to deepen our understanding of Sacraments, of what to quote the old catechism, what are outward signs of inward grace. The most important Sacrament is Christ himself, the ultimate outward sign of inward grace, the Sacrament of God. The Church is a sacrament of Christ. In Christ stating that he is the Bread of Life, though there are allusions to the Eucharist, the main focus is himself who is our way to the Father. The reading I sense encourages us to be aware of the Sacramentality of that is created since its ultimate creator is God and creations is always linked to the love and power of God. What does 'God in all things' mean to you? We are called to be attentive to God's grace within. So as we are attentive to Christ, the Bread of Life, may we discern his presence, through which all was made.

To help appreciate this sense of Sacramentality in our life I will lead us through one of the exercises of St Ignatius. His contemplation on Divine Love. Love is know by the gifts we receive and give. I will ask you to reflect on God gifts.

Think of the gifts you have received, your life, those you love, all that you appreciate.

Think of gifts you have received through your faith and knowing Christ.

Think of God with you in your struggles, working with you. In thinking of the gifts reflect on the source of these gifts and give thanks.

#### **Pope Francis on Prayer**

Dear Brothers and Sisters, today we resume our series of catechesis on prayer by reflecting on the life of the great Prophet Elijah. In the Gospels, Elijah appears with Moses on the Mount of the Transfiguration, bearing witness to Jesus as the fulfilment of the Old Testament prophecies. Elijah is venerated above all in the monastic tradition as a model of prayer and unshakeable faith amid trials. Prayer and contemplation sustained the Prophet not only in moments of great success but also in the face of adversity and persecution.

Elijah teaches us that fervent prayer and union with God cannot be separated from concern for the needs of others. In prayer, he grew in discernment of the Lord's will and found the courage to denounce injustice, even at great personal cost. Elijah's experience of God in prayer culminated, as we know, when the Lord appeared to him not in wind and fire, but in a quiet whisper. May we too, like the Prophet, persevere in prayer, strive to discern God's will every day of our lives, and come to experience, even at times of uncertainty and trial, the consolation of his Matthew 9:35-10:1

#### **Civil Unrest**

This week I have been at some online meetings of Tyne and Wear Citizens and Citizens UK to discuss what the response should be to the civil disorder we have witnessed in recent days. It has brought home, that many Muslims, refugees and members of minority groups who have witnessed the unrest are understandably very frightened, unwilling to go outside. Apart from praying for all involved, what else can be done. If we come across those who have accepted the disinformation on social media, we can ask if it is possible to have difficult conversations though this must be done in a way that is respectful and not provoking. I sense our main responsibility is to simply to reach out to anyone we know who may feel threatened and vulnerable. There were 60 of us at the TWC meeting on Tuesday, about quarter from the Catholic community in our diocese. Those from Muslim, minority and refugee groups were appreciated the support of TWC reaching out at this time of need. Any gesture of support or solidarity you can show will be appreciated.

On Thursday afternoon, with others from Tyne and Wear Citizens in North Tyneside and the parish , we visited the Hillhead Islamic Cultural Centre in Whitley Bay with flowers and card from the parish to show our solidarity and support with them. We had a lovely welcome with our visit being much appreciated.
